that proposals, contracts, and other special funding instruments are under development or have been submitted by staff at this time.

NEW GRANTS

Welfare-to-Work Collaboration (PD# 9829). Olive-Harvey College, in cooperation with Metropolitan Family Services, has requested \$1,500,000 from the U.S. Department of Labor to provide welfare recipients with transitional assistance into unsubsidized employment. The agreement with Olive-Harvey College is for \$500,000. Period of performance: October 1, 1998 through September 30, 1999.

Chemistry Systemic Reform Initiatives (PD# 9831). The Teaching and Learning Institute at City Colleges of Chicago along with eight other Illinois Community Colleges have requested \$238,230 (\$20,000 to City Colleges of Chicago) from the National Science Foundation to improve chemistry curricula in an effort to meet the needs of students enrolled in community colleges. Period of performance: June 1, 1998 through May 31, 2000.

Learning Resource Center Information Infrastructure Enhancement (PD# 9833). City Colleges of Chicago has requested \$24,122 (Daley/\$4,116; Kennedy-King/\$4,080; Truman/\$4,080; Harold Washington/\$4,080; Olive-Harvey/\$3,686; and Malcolm X/\$4,080) from the Illinois Board of Higher Education to upgrade computer workstations. Period of performance: September 1, 1997 through August 31, 1998.

JTPA Dislocated Worker Technology Demonstration Program (PD# 9837). Wright College has requested \$750,000 from the U.S. Department of Labor (Employment and Training Administration) to develop a workforce development system that partners with employees and training providers to train dislocated workers for jobs in high-technology occupations. Period of performance: July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999.

School-to-Work Partnership (PD# 9838). Malcolm X College, a subcontractor to DePaul University, has requested \$326,000 (\$14,000 to Malcolm X College) from the U.S. Department of Education to develop partnerships and curricula that will facilitate the transition of secondary students to postsecondary education or employment. Period of performance: March 17 through September 30, 1998.

Minority Education Achievement Program (PD# 9839). Harold Washington College has requested \$50,000 from the Illinois Board of Higher Education to design strategies to attract, recruit, and enroll Chicago Public School seniors in Harold Washington College. Period of performance: September 1, 1998 through August 31, 1999.

Advancing Opportunities Welfare-to-Work Program (PD# 9840). Central Office has requested \$1,800,000 from the Illinois Community College Board/Illinois Department of Human Services to provide education and training for welfare recipients who are in need of employment skills to be competitive for job entry or advancement in the workplace. Period of performance: July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999.

CONTINUATION GRANTS

State Pre-kindergarten Program (PD# 9830). Central Office coordinated the submission of a proposal for all City Colleges that requested \$740,741 from the Illinois State Board of Education to provide preschool experiences for three- and four-year-old children who are at risk of academic failure. Period of performance: July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999.

Building Opportunity Single Parent Program (PD# 9832). Kennedy-King College has requested \$55,000 from the Illinois State Board of Education to provide low income single women and displaced homemakers with academic and skill training to increase their standard of living and eliminate the need for welfare. Period of performance: July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999.

Career Access Center Job Education and Training Project (PD# 9834). Kennedy-King College/Dawson Technical Institute has requested \$100,000 from the Illinois Community College Board to provide remediation, education, and job training and placement to economically disadvantaged persons. Period of performance: July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999.

Summer Food Service Program (PD# 9835). Central Office has requested \$165,000 from the Illinois State Board of Education to provide hot breakfast and lunch to National Youth Sports Program participants at Daley, Kennedy-King, Malcolm X, Olive-Harvey, and Truman Colleges. The grant will also provide meals to children participating in the Upward Bound and Chicago Prep programs at Daley College. Period of performance: April 15 through September 30, 1998.

JTPA Career Center Program (PD# 9836). Wright College has requested \$70,000 from the Illinois Community College Board to develop short-term education and training courses that will assist participants in locating and retaining employment. Period of performance: July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999.

Chicago Manufacturing Center Consortium (PD# 9841). Daley College has requested \$250,000 from the Illinois Board of Higher Education to provide manufacturing modernization and other assistance to small- and medium- sized manufacturing companies. Period of performance: September 1, 1998 through August 31, 1999.

GRANT SUBCONTRACTING

Chicago School-to-Work Opportunities System (PD# 9807). As part of the terms and conditions of the School-to-Work program as previously approved by the Board (Board Report 20430), City Colleges of Chicago has negotiated subcontracts with NCI Research for \$18,750 and University of Illinois at Chicago for \$30,000. NCI Research will provide a well-documented environmental scan report of Chicago area employers. The University of Illinois at Chicago will assist in the creation of a new 2+2+2 program in wire manufacturing.

CONTRIBUTIONS

The Instituto Cervantes has donated 260 books and manuals to Truman College. This gift of 260 books, written and published in the Spanish language, covers educational topics, historical biographies, art books, and contemporary novels. Spanish speaking students and faculty will derive educational, cultural and recreational benefits from this contribution.

THE CHANCELLOR**RECOMMENDS**

that the Board of Trustees approves submission of these proposals to the appropriate funding agencies, and authorizes the execution of all documents by the Chancellor or the Executive Director of Resource Development, the Assistant Secretary of the Board and the General Counsel for the acceptance of any funding that may be forthcoming; said funds to be subject to the terms and conditions set forth by the grantors, and not to be expended by the Board for any other purposes.
