Office of Vocational Training & Development

The Office of Vocational Training & Development (OVTD) was established at Harold Washington College (HWC) in 1993. Its programs originated from the former Chicago City-Wide College's Center for Program Development for the Handicapped in 1979. The Illinois Department of Human Services, Developmental Disabilities Division, has been the funding source for the past 19 years. HWC is the only City College that offers a variety of employment opportunities to the developmentally disabled population.

Services are targeted to reach special education program participants, and referrals are obtained from community agencies serving persons with developmental disabilities. Participants must be 18 years of age or older. Written verification of a developmental disability is required. All students are thoroughly assessed prior to enrollment to determine their individual career goals and service needs. Personcentered planning techniques and individualized service delivery are emphasized to create the desired outcomes for students. After the initial assessment, many students may be eligible for academic classes, vocational training, or job placement. The goal is to provide continuous support towards the accomplishment of competitive employment.

HWC's Vocational Development academic classes include courses designed to enhance students' skills in reading, writing, and math. Money management, work ethics, and job development are also introduced. The classes run for eight weeks and are in session year-round. OVTD offers over thirty courses which are tailored to meet the students' special needs.

Vocational Training on-site job training serves adults with developmental disabilities. Training can last up to four months or more if needed. Permanent training

sites, the Hyatt Regency Chicago and the University of Illinois Hospital, provide training in housekeeping, food service, public areas, laundry, stewarding, and materials management. If these two sites do not offer the desired training, staff locates a training site appropriate to the desired goals. And, starting in December, 1998, stipends will be offered to the training students in the program.

Job placement and supported employment job coaching is also provided. Once an individual is placed in a job, OVTD initiates ongoing communication with the employer to regularly check on the individual's progress. If necessary, we will provide on-site job coaching to ensure that the employer is making the appropriate accommodations for the individual with a disability. We will also work to ensure that the newly-hired individual can handle the responsibilities of the position, often shadowing that individual throughout the workday.

Chicago Public Schools Initiative

The department is reaching out to identify new students in partnership with the Chicago Public Schools Transition Division. On April 16, 1998, OVTD participated in the Friends of Special Education Community Resource Fair. And, following the Chancellor's lead to develop stronger relationships with the Chicago Public Schools, members of the Office of Vocational Training & Development met with Ms. Delores Freeman, Coordinator, Special Education Transition Team, and several of her Transition Team members in May, 1998. During that meeting, six schools were identified for initial contacts:

Meetings are being arranged with principals and special educational teachers and counselors to open up dialogues to ensure that information about the opportunities provided by HWC's OVTD is distributed among appropriate students.

Through this partnership and the excellent work of the OVTD staff, a total of 51 students enrolled in phase one of the fall semester, of which 29 were recruited from the CPS schools. And, in phase two of the fall semester, we enjoyed an increase of 50%, with 75 students enrolled, of which 60 were from the CPS schools.

Other outreach efforts to CPS included a luncheon to showcase our services and highlight to those interested the changes we have made to the program. On September 22, 1998, CPS principals, special education teachers, and counselors learned more about the vocational program we offer at HWC for adults with developmental

disabilities. Many CPS transition counselors and staff attended the luncheon from:

A new case-management approach has been implemented to ensure that each client receives the most appropriate services to achieve his/her goals.

New relationships are being forged with private industry such as Dominicks Finer Foods to place students. A new recruitment video has been developed. Ongoing training sites and internships are being identified in order to provide students with as many options and skills necessary to *obtain* and *retain* entry-level positions within industry, local businesses, community agencies and the academic community.
