NEW GRANTS

BP Amoco Foundation (PD # 0131)

The District Office has received funding from the BP Amoco Foundation for a Nonprofit Technology Advancement Initiative for community based organizations in the City of Chicago. The Foundation funded the purchase of computer equipment to these agencies and granted the City Colleges of Chicago funding to provide computer technology training for the staff of the community based organizations. The staff members were invited to enroll in classes at the college location most convenient for them. The City Colleges of Chicago received a grant of \$30,000 for training during the period from September 1, 2000 through August 30, 2001.

A Model Project for Preparing At-Risk Low Income Students for A Successful College Experience (PD# 0133)

Daley College has submitted a proposal to the US Department of Education, Office of Postsecondary Education (Trio Programs) for a model project to help prepare at-risk and low income students for success in college. The proposal requests \$1,229,117 for a five year project. The performance period for this project is from September 1, 2001 through August 31, 2006

Technology as Core Value (PD#0134)

Malcolm X College has received an award for \$10,000 from the Illinois Board of Higher Education under the Leadership and Core Values initiative. The project will, "introduce the value of technology into instruction and establish ethic values involved in using computer technology" The performance period for the project is from July 1, 2000 until June 30, 2001.

Illinois First - Technology Enhancement (PD# 0135)

Olive-Harvey College has received a legislative add-on grant for \$25,000 to implement technology improvements. The project will include funds for network wiring and telecommunications hardware. The performance period for the project is from November 1, 2000 until November 1, 2001.

Creating Employment Opportunities for Low Income Residents: Developing New Employment and Self-Employment Skills (PD# 0136)

Wright College is submitting a proposal for \$500,000 to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for a project which will create new

employment and business opportunities for low-income individuals by providing technical and financial assistance to private employers, self-employers, and new business development programs. The performance period for the project is from June 1, 2001 until May 31, 2004.

Growing Global Education Relations: A Project to Share Educational Strategies and Strengthen Understanding (PD# 0137)

Wright College is submitting a proposal for \$120,000 to the U.S. Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs for a project which will strengthen mutual understanding and cooperation among American and foreign educational institutions. The performance period for the project is from July 1, 2001 until June 30, 2004.

International Business and Education Enhancement Project (PD# 0138)

Wright College is submitting a proposal for \$85,000 to the U.S. Department of Education (Title VI:B) for a project which will enhance and expand the export business education programs under Wright's International Business Institute (WIBI). The performance period for the project is from July 1, 2000 until June 30, 2001.

Chicago City College Teachers for a New Millennium: Incorporating Technological Studies of Humanities into Teaching (PD# 0139)

Wright College is submitting a proposal for \$200,000 to the National Endowment for the Humanities for a project which will, "engage City College faculty in pursuit of professional development that will allow them to enrich their own and their students' understanding of humanities using technology." The performance period for the project is from May 1, 2001 until April 30, 2002.

Opening the Doors to Technology: Making Technology More Available to the Wright Community (PD# 0140)

Wright College is submitting a proposal for \$50,000 to the Illinois Community Technology Fund Committee for a project to make technology more available and accessible to low-income individuals and families, and to assist participants to achieve better results in school and job training. The performance period for the project is from January 1, 2001 until December 31, 2001.

Illinois First - Malcolm X Projects (PD# 0141)

Malcolm X College has received a legislative add-on grant for \$340,000 to fund the evening child care program (\$140,000) and to develop its small business development center (\$200,000). The performance period for the project is from November 1, 2000 until June 30, 2002.

Upward Bound Program Expansion (PD# 0143)

Daley College has submitted a proposal to the U.S. Department of Education for \$85,525 to expand the current Upward Bound program so as to serve an additional 20 students. The performance period for the project is from September 1, 2000 until August 31, 2001

Richard Florsheim Art Acquisition Grant to Benefit Senior Artists (PD# 0145)

Harold Washington College has submitted a proposal for \$15,000 to the Richard Florsheim Art Fund for the acquisition of art for the college from visiting artists over the age of sixty years. The performance period for the project is from January 1, 2001 until December 31, 2003.

CONTINUATION GRANTS

Improving Minority Success through Articulation With Community-Based Organizations (PD# 0130)

The Illinois Board of Higher Education has approved a renewal grant, under the Higher Education Cooperation Act, for \$192,000 to the City Colleges of Chicago to improve articulation and transfer activities and to increase the number of minority students who enroll in community colleges and, subsequently, transfer to four-year institutions. The project is funded for the period from September 1, 2000 through August 31, 2001. The grant provisions include a specified fund of \$127,150 for subcontracts to community based organizations as follows:

Minority Student Transfer Centers (PD# 0132)

The Illinois Board of Higher Education has approved a renewal grant, under the Higher Education Cooperation Act, for \$528,000 to the City Colleges of Chicago to improve the delivery of academic support services and accurate transfer course advisement to minority, at-risk students who are enrolled in the City Colleges of Chicago. The project is funded for the period from September 1, 2000 through August 31, 2001.

Illinois Arts Council - Public Radio and Television Grants (PD# 0144)

WYCC-TV / Channel 20 has been notified that it will receive funding of up to \$340,758.66 for operating costs for WYCC from the Illinois Arts Council. The performance period for the project is from July 1, 2000 until June 30, 2001

GIFTS

Swedish Trade Council (PD# 0142)

The Swedish Trade Council has donated computer equipment, valued at approximately \$3,500, to Kennedy-King College. The equipment includes seven Compaq computers (486 and Pentium, 1 laptop).
