that Security has 5 new towers located in all parking lots which will help control parking access, increase Security visibility, and offer additional points of contact for Security to assist and interact with students, staff, and visitors. These towers are situated to give ample views of the parking lots and grounds to offer better surveillance during the hours from 7a-10p; and

that KKC has effectively partnered with the 7th District Chicago Police Department and Commander Anthony Carothers in creating an exclusive Chicago Patrol unit specifically for Kennedy-King College. CPD Unit 785 is on campus Monday-Friday from 7a-3p and 3p to 9p offering assistance during incidents or patrolling the interior and exterior grounds. The existence of this unit has seen vehicle vandalisms and theft virtually eliminated from our campus and the immediate surrounding area; and

that in an effort to inform all campus occupants of the many emergency and safety protocols, Emergency Response Handbooks and College Safety Guides were created by the Security Department to answer questions that many may have. These booklets are available throughout the campus at the designated Security posts for all to have. They were designed small so that they can be kept handy and reviewed when the need arises; and

that KKC has implemented the Volunteer Fire Marshal Program that further creates a safe environment for the KKC campus. Comprised of staff and faculty volunteers, these individuals assist with the orderly evacuation of our facility in the event of an emergency. These individuals are kept abreast of pertinent information regarding fire safety and complete an orientation with the Security Department to prepare for the most common scenarios during emergency response situations. There assistance further promotes a comfortable stability that should be commonplace at an institution of higher learning.
