Increase the number of students earning college credentials of economic value; Increase the rate of transfer to bachelor's degree programs following City College graduation.

Summary

This project would result in the implementation of an innovative project-based learning (PBL) curriculum in several courses offered at Harold Washington College. Supporting activities would include: undergraduate student research opportunities both at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) and with other community partners, the creation of a PBL Community (professional development/mentoring group for students and faculty) and strategic partnerships with UIC and other four year institutions (transfer opportunities). The project would also offer PBL seminars for CCC faculty across the District, and from different disciplines, who are interested in implementing project-based learning in their classrooms. Over the course of the grant, 240 CCC students would participate in PBL courses, 40 students would be selected to do summer research and 75 faculty would attend PBL workshops. Funds would be used to pay for student summer research stipends, laboratory supplies (classroom and summer research), PBL Community activities and seminars for faculty.

Drastically improve outcomes for students requiring remediation; Increase number of students earning college credentials of economic value.

Summary

The Workforce Academy has applied for a grant from Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (IDCEO) in order to: (1) train unemployed individuals from a targeted population (i.e., minorities, women) for jobs in the building trades industry and (2) provide the necessary wraparound services (soft skills, career planning, and retention support) to ensure both academic and career success for the participants. The grant sets a target for the Workforce Academy to train and place at least 50 participants. Partnering with Dawson, The Workforce Academy is pursuing this grant in its role as a centralized, coordinating entity within CCC to write the grant, manage its reporting requirements, ensure that cohort participants are being adequately served, and manage the overall project (stipends, workshops, registration of students, tuition assistance, job placement assistance). The project targets four career training programs including: (1) Electrical Overhead Line Worker, (2) Concrete Masonry, (3) Carpentry, and (4) Plumbing.

Through the use of BTOP funding, City Colleges of Chicago has installed 1,324 new PCs and laptops. These computers are located in Public Computing Centers located at the seven college campuses as well as at the satellite locations at Dawson Tech, South Chicago Learning Center, Arturo Velasquez Institute, Humboldt Park Vocational Education Center, and the Westside Learning Center. There were approximately 32,000 computer users per week at these locations. BTOP funding was also used to update the wireless broadband technology at these locations. This grant is being amended to decrease the award amount received from \$2,245,340 to \$2,005,856.

Mitchell International, Inc. (PD# 1309075)

Software service provider Mitchell International, Inc. made a donation of 25 unique software user licenses for estimating software to be used by the body shop program at Kennedy- King College. This

donation is being amended to correct the value of the software previously estimated at \$3,000. The value of the software has been updated and is now estimated at \$5,400.
