## Summary

This new grant is an extension of the No Child Left Behind Title 1 funding, which Olive-Harvey Middle College currently receives and would impact approximately 87 Middle College students. Activities will focus on teaching and principal leadership through training and professional development. The outcomes will support and positively impact student engagement, active learning and the development of interventions for students academically challenged. Funds from this grant would be used to cover the cost of professional development/trainings and additional instructional activities for teachers and advisors to improve effective instructional practices for this student population.

Drastically improve outcomes for students needing remediation; Increase the quality and effectiveness of student services and support; Ensure safe and secure teaching and learning environments.

#### **Summary**

This new grant is an extension of the No Child Left Behind Title 1 funding, which Truman Middle College currently receives. This grant would impact approximately 90 Middle College students enrolled in 3 classes. These funds will allow the Middle School to hire a part-time teacher to provide one—on—one instruction for students struggling academically, and to provide additional supervision to students in need of mentoring/additional monitoring. Expected outcomes would include: a higher rate of transition to dual enrollment and/or college careers, increased participation in extracurricular activities and test prep classes and increased involvement in academic planning.

#### Summary

Wright College was selected to participate in a two-year project designed to expand current research on equity in student achievement and to identify promising evidence-based interventions for improving student learning and success. This grant will support the design, implementation, and assessment of Wright College's action plan to advance equity in student learning and success focusing on bridging the academic achievement gap impacting low income and students of color. Wright College's Equity Action Plan has four primary goals, which include: 1) increase student access to and participation in High Impact Practices (HIPs); 2) increase course completion, retention and

graduation rates for low income, first-generation adult learners and/or minority students; 3) increase achievement of learning outcomes of underserved students using direct assessment measures; and 4)increase student understanding of guided learning pathways that incorporate HIPs and the value to workforce preparation and engaged citizenship (completion with purpose).

Funds received from this grant would support program development, professional development, outreach and a CCC Equity Symposium.

## Summary

The CCC Tech Hire Initiative would be a new grant for the City Colleges of Chicago.

This grant targets projects that help participants begin careers in H-1B occupations and industries which are in-demand and/or high growth in the Chicago area. A focus of this program is "Training along a career pathway that leads to an industry-recognized credential and employment in middle - and high-skilled jobs in H-1B occupations and industries."

The CCC Tech Hire Initiative would adopt a career pathways model as its project design framework and would serve a minimum of 400 participants (targeting individuals between 17 – 29 years of age, who are out-of-secondary school, and face barriers to training and employment opportunities) over the 48 month performance period.

Targeting Advanced Manufacturing and IT career pathways, this grant would incorporate the use of employer validated curricula, academic and non-academic support services, and employment experiences and opportunities. This strategy would allow for multiple entry and exit points along the pathways, increasing the likelihood that the target population will complete a significant level of training before they secure a job, and allow them to step back into school to earn higher credentials as they are able.

Required primary partners include:

- City Colleges of Chicago/Daley and Wright Colleges Project Lead and Education/Training Providers;
- Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership the Workforce Investment System Partner: and
- Illinois Manufacturers' Association (IMA) and Computer Technology Industry Association (CompTIA) Workforce Intermediaries.

Funds would be used to pay for student participant support (paid internships, book scholarships, tuition/gap support, and travel) salaries/benefits of project staff at both colleges, sub-awards to partners and supplies.

CCC would benefit from the awarding of credentials of value/associate degrees through the implementation of this career pathways model (project design framework) to meet the needs of the target population.
