Summary

The Consortium for Teacher Education in Middle School Math, Science and Technology Concepts (MSTQE) is a renewal grant for CCC. The Northeastern Illinois University, Wright College, and Truman College Consortium for Teacher Education in Middle School Math, Science and Technology Concepts (MSTQE) was an outcome of a federal Teacher Quality Enhancement Grant given to the State of Illinois.

Wright College and Truman College have been working with Northeastern Illinois University for over ten years through a joint bridge program, MSTQE (Middle School Teaching of Math and Science). This program is designed for students interested in elementary education who seek an endorsement to teach mathematics and science at the middle school level.

The MSTQE program serves approximately 50 students each fiscal year from Wright alone. This bridge program aims to increase transfer rates between Wright and Truman Colleges' and Northeastern Illinois University, in the area of middle-school teaching education.
