

- One of the world's first universities located on the original medieval foundations in the heart of Paris and beyond (13th c.)
- The largest institution dedicated to the study of literature, languages, civilizations, arts, humanities and social sciences in France today
- Over 400 students of all ages from all around the world are welcomed each July to one of Europe's most prestigious universities for a moment of culture and exchange
- Sorbonne professors offer beginner to advanced French as a foreign language courses, evening conferences in humanities and arts in French or in English, and optional cultural excursions



## Courses, Tuition, Room and Board



The Sorbonne University offers, in collaboration with SIAL, French courses (as a foreign language). Each course is 2 weeks long.

6 levels are available: level A1.1, A1.2, A2, B1, B2, and C1 (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages).

A1.1, A1.2, A2 and B1 40 hours in total

The hours of courses for these levels consist of general French courses only, during which students work on several skills: oral comprehension, written comprehension, oral expression and written expression. The chosen themes and media further enable participants to become familiar with different aspects of French education and University system, and the history of the Latin Quarter.

#### Schedule

Monday to Friday 9:30am - 12:00pm and 1:00pm-2:30pm

A tour of the Sorbonne is offered with the courses. Evening conferences are also free of charge for participants of the French courses.

compulsory if you cannot provide official
proof of your level in French. The test can
be taken online.

### Selection and Documentation



#### Selection Criteria

- Completion of French 101 or above in Spring 2019 semester and concurrent enrollment in French 102 or above in Summer 2019
- 3.0 graduation GPA or above and in previous French courses
- 12 credit hours completed at Harold Washington College prior to study abroad semester
- Two Interviews
  - Department: World Languages Department Chair and French Faculty
  - College: Administrator, World Languages Department Chair and accompanying French Faculty member, Wellness Center and Student Government Association representative
- Demonstrate the ability to work collaboratively and to travel and study intensively in a foreign setting

### **Required Documentation**

- Copy of current passport or resident card and related visas, if applicable, valid for entry into France and re-entry into the United States at least 6 months beyond travel dates
- Official College Transcript(s)
- Three Recommendations
  - French Faculty Evaluation
  - Non-French Faculty member letter
  - Employer or member of the community letter
- Resume/Curriculum Vitae
- Application Essay
