#### Summary

This is a new grant for Wright. The goal of the Expanding the Solar Workforce through the Illinois Community College System project is to create and sustain a comprehensive, statewide strategy that equips education and training providers, workers, businesses, and communities with resources and tools to prepare a solar workforce. A cohort of six Illinois community colleges are expected to participate in the program based on their capacity and interest, as well as their potential for and proximity to industry growth in the state: City Colleges of Chicago, College of Lake County, John A. Logan College, Kankakee Community College, Lewis and Clark Community College, and Lincoln Land Community College. Funds will be used for curriculum development, student outreach and grants, and job placement and support. Additionally, three industry partners are expected to participate in the program: Elevate Energy, Midwest Renewable Energy Association, and StraightUp Solar. These initial three business/industry partners will act as an advisory group to provide data and guidance on needed skills for the solar workforce to ensure curricula is accessible and industrydriven.

#### Summary

This a new grant. CCC would focus on achieving unprecedented increases in our retention and completion rates among students of color, whom represent 75% of our credit student population. This would work by identifying and recruiting students who could most benefit from these efforts using its tiered coaching framework and ensure that the program reinforces the completion of critical milestones that we know are indicators of student success. CCC is partnering with One Million Degrees to plan a "Culture of Coaching" strategy across its seven colleges, which takes a differentiated, holistic, and team-based approach to supporting students based on their needs and goals. The funds will be used as follows: Project Manager/Consultant \$45,000; Project Coordinator (CCC student/Alum) \$30,000; General operations - CCC \$25,000; Marketing, Communications, and Design \$50,000.

#### Summary

This a new grant. COVID-19 has dramatically changed the final semester of high school for seniors. As such, they may be feeling a lack of confidence about college in general, and ill-equipped to do their best on CCC placement exams. We believe by offering concentrated test preparatory workshops to CPS students, they will gain additional skills and confidence to possibly move up a level in the placement tests in math and English, ideally eliminating their need for developmental coursework. We propose offering 500 students, who are not at college level in either English or Math or both, in the above listed categories the option to enroll in Test Preparatory workshops free of charge. We will incentivize participation and completion of the Test Prep Workshop by offering \$250 scholarship for fall enrollment upon completion. Students will be required to attend a minimum of 7 of the 8 days of the Workshop, and take a post-test. The post-test score will not prohibit their access to the scholarship. Successful completion of the test preparatory workshop has the potential to net \$500 in scholarships, if a student completes both the English and math test prep. These testpreparatory workshops are completely new. While we have offered sessions at some campuses called Level-Up, these sessions are four weeks long and vary in content. These Test Preparatory sessions will be designed around our placement tests and students will be given direct instruction on how to perform their best. Additionally, they will be allowed to retest at the end of the workshops for the chance to improve their scores, and move up a level(s) in course placement.

#### Summary

This is a new grant for the Chancellor's Retention Fund. This grant will support for the Chancellor's Retention Grant Fund (CRG), CCC has prioritized approximately 2,710 students closest to completion who are in good academic standing and are carrying balances that would impact their ability to complete. By lifting the balance, the CRG is providing an incentive for students to finish the last mile. Students in every category, with the exception of the Access Grant, were eligible to have up to \$800 of their fall balance covered. The amount of the balance is paid with the \$800 credit. In order to identify who would be eligible we pulled data sets to identify students who could make the most out of a one-time grant. They needed to have a minimum GPA of 2.0. We also looked at how close they were to completing the credential as well as if they had access to financial aid.

#### Summary

This is a continuation intergovernmental agreement with the option to extend two more years at 1.2 million dollars per year. This is the third amendment of a five-year contract. CCC will deliver quality education to Chicago Housing Authority (CHA) residents whom qualify for the Partners in Education Program. Additionally, funds will be used for student support services, 2 Project Coordinators, 1 Staff Assistant and 7 Summer Site Monitor Salaries. The Site Monitor salaries are temporary positions that will be used to support the 6-week summer Learn and Earn Program. Marketing material and office supplies will also be covered by CHA funds for this program. CHA will reimburse CCC for all expenses over the course of a year up to 1.2 million dollars.

#### Summary

This is a new grant for District/Early College. This funding will support new youth apprenticeship program with CPS, Career Launch Chicago. Assist with Career Launch team development including Project Manager position and Student Support Coaches. Funding will also be used for student supportive service costs such as transportation, childcare, etc. and can be used to reimburse a percentage of wages to small to medium size employer partners. This will impact 200 students enrolled in DOL Registered Apprenticeships, and 1,000 students participating in per-apprenticeship or youth apprenticeship programming over 4-year period.

#### Summary

This is a new grant for Malcolm X College. Funds will provide support for curriculum development, student tuition and fees, stipends to support participation in the program, apprenticeship pipeline development, and project administration. This would allow Malcolm X to expand its Community Health Workers program curriculum to include content related to opioid and other substance use disorders, and would allow the creation of apprenticeship opportunities for Malcolm X program completers. This project will train up to 168 community health workers with a specialized focus on servicing youth impacted by opioid and other substance use. Of those, up to 91 will engage in yearlong apprenticeship opportunities at community health organizations that provide services to populations affected by substance abuse.

Strategy 1 would benefit CCC by assisting with targeted outreach and recruitment campaigns for CPS students. Strategy 2 would assist CCC students with test workshops to gain additional skills to possibly move up on placement tests in Math and English, eliminating the need for developmental coursework. Strategy 3 would help eliminate financial hardship for CCC students as they attempt to achieve their credential by offering financial incentives for students to register for coursework.

that the Board of Trustees approves acceptance of any gifts, grants or other funding which may be forthcoming from these proposals and authorizes the Chancellor, the Vice Chancellor for Institutional Advancement, or Associate Vice Chancellor of Development to serve as authorized representative or official representative of the District in the submission of proposals for funding and to execute all documents for the acceptance of this funding or these gifts and the operation of the funded projects; said acceptance to be subject to the terms and conditions set forth by the grantor, including specified subcontracts and purchases, and said funds not to be expended by the Board for any other purposes.
