Expanding our Role as a The Hub" of Education

Over the last three years, Truman College on behalf of City Colleges of Chicago, has positioned itself to be a leader in technology training for educators, students, and community. Through our efforts, Truman College has worked tirelessly to help close the equity gaps that exist for our youth and communities throughout the city of Chicago.

Truman college has specifically addressed issues in equity by:

- Training educators in both informal and formal learning spaces
- Creating learning opportunities for students and community members
- Providing access to resources and supports for educators, students, and community

The Center for Equity in STEAM Education

- As we move into the next phase of our work, Truman College through Innovation One, along with its satellite sites, will house The Center for Equity in STEAM Education (CESE) beginning in Fall 2023.
- With equity as its core driver, CESE will prioritize supporting individuals who face the greatest challenges in reaching their full potential
- CESE will be taking the place of The Center for Excellence in Computer Science Education (CECSE) operated by the Office
 of Community Education Partnerships in the School of Education and Social Policy at Northwestern University

Shifting the work of the "center concept" from computer science to equity provides a more comprehensive approach which will allow us to:

- Create a professional learning community that is more inclusive of a diverse set of practitioners
- Expand our learning opportunities to with a focused effort on developing opportunities where learners can create
- Use equity as a driver to push instructional practices in both informal and formal learning spaces





Early Learning Scholarship


Who are we working with?

Community cohorts- Pathways for Parents

 CELWS is partnering with Truman College, Malcolm X College, Chicago Commons and its delegate agencies to offer community cohorts in Child Development and Human Development Family Studies geared toward parents of children enrolled in early childhood and interested in joining ECE workforce.

Pipeline development- Parent Mentor program

- CELWS is exploring pipeline development to CELWS through partnership with Illinois' Parent Mentor program. Mentors are placed in classrooms across Chicago to assist teachers.
- Organizing agencies include Palenque- Logan Square Neighborhood Association (LSNA), Southwest Organizing Project (SWOP), Teamwork Englewood, Brighton Park Neighborhood Council (BPNC) and The Resurrection Project




ECACE Initiative

The Early Childhood Access Consortium for Equity (ECACE) is a state initiative to increase the number of individuals in the incumbent early childhood workforce with Gateway credentials in associate, bachelor's, and master's degrees.

The initiative includes meeting enrollment targets that were set for each participating college and university in the Consortium. In addition, students enrolled in eligible ECE programs will receive a scholarship from the initiative to support their ability to persist and complete the program.

As the CCC stewards of the Early Childhood Access Consortium for Equity, our team's mission is to center and support the experience of the early childhood workforce as they move through the City Colleges of Chicago system, from contemplation to graduation (and transfer). We do this by:

- Outreaching to and engaging Chicago's Early Childhood Workforce
- Supporting students in enrollment and retention via holistic coaching services and accessing key funding (in particular, the ISAC-ECACE scholarship)
- Investing in Child Development Programs (Faculty, Training, Curriculum, Prior Learning Assessment)



Our Impact

The ECACE team engaged upwards of 300 early childhood workforce members and Child Development students in 2022 to support enrollment, persistence and scholarship access.



Who are we working with?

- It Takes a Village enrolling a Spring 2023 cohort for Child Dev 107 of ~20 Workforce Members from ITAV; this required partnership from the top down and bottom up, including enrollment and scholarship workshops at each site.... A Truman-hosted college + departmental orientation to onboard group.
- Gads Hill 4+ virtual recruitment session/open houses to engage their teachers across all sites
- Carole Robertson In person workshops across 5+ sites, connecting to their Grow Your Own CDA program
- Christopher House In-person workshop at the hub to reach Site
 Directors, followed by 4+ site visits to engage workforce members



SEED SCHOLAR

SEED Scholars

- The S.E.E.D Scholarship at City Colleges of Chicago (CCC) provides a stipend for students at the end of each semester.
- The stipend can be used to cover all tuition, books, and class materials, not already covered by financial aid, for CCC courses on an approved academic pathway.
- If students are not eligible to file for financial aid (via FAFSA) or are not awarded financial aid, the **S.E.E.D scholarship** covers all CCC-approved expenses

Students who are accepted to receive the S.E.E.D Scholarship will be placed in one of two tracks:

- Teach Chicago Tomorrow
- Emerging Educator

Student Experience

Mentorship - All SEED scholars have been provided with a mentor that is a CPS teacher. They meet to discuss personal, professional and academic development in addition to providing insight into what a career consists of.

Counseling Center – A handful of scholars used the counseling center found on campus and there was an increase of scholars that were looking for counseling/therapy services.

Tutor services – Truman tutoring services has been very helpful for those scholars that come to Truman for class and support. Scholars are beginning to branch out into tutoring services across CCC.

OMD Tutoring & Support – For scholars that have a difficult time making it to a CCC campus, we have personalized tutoring through One Million Degrees. They can also find emergency funds, laptop support and professional development workshops.

Teach Chicago Tomorrow Emergency Funds- Scholars have access to the Teach Chicago Tomorrow emergency fund to help pay for books, rent, laptops, equipment and school supplies. A little less than \$8,000 was provided in emergency funding for 2021-2022 academic year – does not include Fall 2023.
