Short-term credentials of one year or less can be a college certificate and/or an industry recognized credential. Some of the major goals of the project are:

- Accelerate the time for the targeted population to enter and succeed in postsecondary education/training programs that lead to employment in high skilled, high wage, and in-demand occupations the pay 30% of the regional living wage or on a pathway.

Summary

Olive–Harvey College (OHC) is a public, two-year community college located on the far southeast side of the city of Chicago, Illinois. As one of the City Colleges of Chicago, the largest community college system in Illinois, OHC serves as the Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics (TDL) Center of Excellence for career and technical programs. With this grant, OHC will continue its workforce equity initiative to support Project Evolve, which offers accelerated job training and tuition- free certificate programs to residents of nine communities in the immediate vicinity of the main campus: Avalon Park, Burnside, Chatham, Pullman (campus location), Riverdale, Roseland, S. Chicago, S. Deering, and W. Pullman. The majority (65%–99%) of households in the nine targeted communities are Black or African American, experience medium-to-high economic hardship, and record above average unemployment rates. Federally recognized as a Predominantly Black Institution since 2010, OHC’s student population is 71% African- American and 24% Hispanic, due to the community support and aspirations for upward mobility in its local neighborhoods.

During 2022, the NASH Institute for Systems Innovation & Improvement launched an initiative which applied Improvement Science methodology via 'NASH Improvement Communities (NICs)' to three problems of practice identified by member systems as high priorities: transfer, curricular flexibility, and equity gaps in degree completion. To date, 15 systems and 36 campus teams have participated in the NICs (~340 individuals), with an additional cohort of four systems joining the Transfer NIC in 2023.

Building on this success, with generous funding from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, NASH is now in position to expand the Transfer NIC with a third cohort. Funding will allow NASH to provide CCC with project management, improvement science coaching, knowledge management, as well as technical support to system and campus teams. In addition, there will be \$20,000 of funding available directly to CCC to support travel and other costs. Allowable expenses will be used for tuition, books, fees, travel, supplies and equipment.
