The Chicago Early Learning Workforce Scholarship (CELWS) aims to support the current and future early childhood (birth through Pre-K) workforce in the City of Chicago by offering students coverage of tuition, fees, and book costs, as well as specialized a scholarship and Early Learning advising, both at City Colleges and partner four-year institutions. CELWS assists qualifying CCC students in the achievement of a basic or advanced certificate, an Associates degree, State of Illinois early childhood credential, and endorsements and/or licensure in qualified subject areas; or qualifying students in the achievement of a Bachelor's degree, early childhood credential, professional educator's license, or endorsement in early childhood education and related fields. The NSAW renewal will support KKC's continued expansion of the Culinary and Hospitality program at Washburne . The expansion will include the addition of enhanced industry partnerships and expanded credentialing opportunities, supported by on-the-job training funds that will allow students to gain paid, real-world experience while completing their coursework. There is also a greater focus on working with returning residents. These resources will not only ease financial barriers but also strengthen pathways to employment by linking classroom learning with employer-validated skills. Affordability and accessibility remain central to KKC's approach. Tuition costs will be subsidized by other college resources, ensuring that returning residents face minimal financial burdens while pursuing certification. Operational efficiencies, use of open educational resources, and cutting-edge instructional models will also sustain affordability while maintaining program quality. By adding a job training coach, the initiative further enhances wraparound support—ensuring not just training, but also successful job placement and long-term career retention

With the support of the FY26 NSAW grant, Harry S Truman will build directly upon the foundation established during grant years one and two through the Apple NC3 partnership. The work completed so far has strengthened our capacity to deliver high quality non-credit learning opportunities, and we will expand this momentum. A central priority will be ensuring smooth transitions for students into and across information technology and engineering pathways. We will continue to align student support with workforce demands, enabling participants to enter and progress within these high-demand fields with clarity and confidence. A series of events and workshops will be organized for local small businesses, fostering stronger partnerships between education and industry. By combining these interconnected strategies-building on the successes of Apple NC3, strengthening transitions into IT and engineering programs, connecting with small businesses, and targeting resources toward program delivery-we will continue advancing educational outcomes and supporting workforce and economic development across the region.

Richard J. Daley College was awarded funding to continue to run and to build on the success of its established CNC, Welding, and Industrial Maintenance Electrical Technician (IME) programs by expanding into new areas of workforce development that respond to evolving industry needs. In addition to continuing these core programs, Daley College will launch new noncredit offerings focused on basic skills, emerging technologies, clean energy, and advanced manufacturing. These offerings will be developed in close collaboration with local employers to ensure alignment with current and future workforce demands. Richard J. Daley College proposes a workforce development initiative that delivers three foundational courses—Introduction to Manufacturing Technologies, Lean Manufacturing, and Blueprint Reading—to prepare Chicago residents for entry-level roles in advanced manufacturing. These courses are designed to meet the needs of both adult learners and high school students, with flexible scheduling and delivery through Daley College and other CCC campuses. Also, courses in Charging Station Installation and Electronics Repair Technician will be developed and piloted. Similarly Industrial Sewing will be expanded through the input of local industrial sewing employers. Grant funds will be used to cover tuition for students, instructor salaries, and instructional materials. For the 3-class series Tooling U-SME modules will be integrated into Brightspace to enhance learning outcomes. Funds may also support outreach, orientation, and student support services.

This NSAW grant will help support MXC to expand non-credit workforce training programs with a focus on two high-demand areas: Information Technology (IT) and Healthcare. The proposed project includes two integrated components: Information Technology Pathways, and Expansion of CPR Training Programs. New programs will include Pediatric CPR, Advanced Cardiovascular Life Support (ACLS), and BLS in Spanish. These additions are strategically designed to increase both access and impact. Spanish-language CPR courses will eliminate language barriers and expand lifesaving knowledge within Latino communities, fostering inclusion while improving survival rates during cardiac emergencies. ACLS training equips healthcare professionals with advanced competencies to respond effectively to complex cardiac situations, while Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS) ensures readiness to address cardiac and respiratory emergencies in children and infants.

This grant initiative award will support Olive-Harvey to expand its Essential Employability Skills Academy, increasing offerings for both students and employers seeking professional development. Allowing enhanced training in communication, ethics, teamwork, and workplace readiness to meet evolving employer expectations. OHC will also broaden its Business and Supply Chain programming, continuing to offer noncredit courses such as Freight Brokerage and Six Sigma, while introducing new programs aligned with emerging industries. Additionally, the college will support the newly launched Entrepreneurship Hub, which provides targeted workshops, technical assistance, and business solutions for small, minority, and woman-owned businesses. OHC is also leading the way in electric vehicle (EV) workforce development. The college offers a Rivian Technician training program and a new Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Training program that prepares students to install, maintain, and repair EV charging stations. These hands-on, noncredit programs are designed to be accessible to underrepresented learners and provide direct pathways into high-demand technical roles. Future expansion will include EV conversion training, in partnership with SELOC and other collaborators, teaching students to retrofit combustion engine vehicles into electric-powered systems. This initiative supports Illinois' clean energy goals while creating new employment opportunities for students and small businesses. Grant funds will support

Wright College Continuing Education (WRCE) was awarded funding to expand its Noncredit Workforce Training Initiative, which has driven significant enrollment growth over the past two years. Workforce courses now represent nearly half of WRCE's total enrollment, increasing overall participation from 1,400 to 2,200 students. Building on this success, the FY26 plan targets high-demand occupations where employers report urgent needs, short-term training leads to recognized credentials, and affordability barriers can be reduced for underserved learners. Priority areas include precision/manual and Swiss CNC machining, legal services support (Notary Signing Agent training and Al for legal workflows), and entry-level credentialed roles such as forklift operation, CDL-B school bus driving, and lifeguarding. The initiative aims to deliver measurable impacts for students, employers, and the region. Students will gain short-term, stackable credentials that improve job readiness and earning potential, while stipends and fee relief reduce barriers for low-income and underrepresented learners. Employers will benefit from customized training cohorts that address immediate workforce gaps and provide upskilling opportunities for current employees. Regionally, the project strengthens the talent pipeline in manufacturing and legal services, while enhanced data collection ensures accountability and demonstrates WRCE's role in workforce development.

Harold Washington College proposes creating four noncredit training programs, two in tech and two in Microsoft Excel. These programs will be based on high-impact, industry-recognized certificate programs designed by Google and Microsoft. The Google certificates, IT Support Professional Certificate and IT Automation with Python will help to prepare students for entry-level roles in the fields of information technology and systems administration. The Microsoft Certificates, Excel Associate MS 200 Exam Prep and Excel Expert MS-201 Exam Prep will help to train students in Excel and provide students with the skills to use it in the workspace. HWC will use funds to hire a Part-Time Job Developer to provide academic advising, regular check ins with students, and organize tutoring sessions for exam prep, and job search coaching. Grant funds will also be used to hire a Part-Time Coordinator to help manage the four programs, provide administrative support for the grant, tuition stipends to help students meet their basic needs, instructor support, and instructional materials. Courses will be delivered via Brightspace and integrated with Google's learning platforms. Funds may also support outreach, orientation, and wraparound services to ensure learner success.
