This project adds the needed infrastructure to address students BNI while increasing student retention and completion at CCC. As part of CCC's Thrive strategy. This grant program will focus on infrastructure by adding key personnel and technology that will be the groundwork for our BNI intervention work. A district director of Basic Needs position has been created to establish a BNI framework and support the colleges in their BNI work. Kennedy-King College is implementing pilot programs related to food insecurity and will add positions that support their on-campus pantry and Food Security for Life program. CCC will also use funds to explore more effective platforms for issuing in-house emergency funds for students. Finally, the program will fund program evaluation to ensure that the work we are doing is effective and yielding positive outcomes for students.

Truman College's concept is to continue the work started with Rev Up EV Round One. This includes expanding credit and non-credit Electrical Vehicle instructional opportunities though industry standard equipment purchases, funding faculty training and travel. The funds will be used to purchase equipment, supplies, support personnel cost, and encourage extensive professional development for faculty and relevant staff. In addition, funds will cover other expenses such as electrical work needed for various equipment. The Truman Automotive Technology team will be impacted, along with students in the rapidly growing program. The students can receive financial support to access temporary housing options. As evidenced by the HOPE Survey, a significant amount of students experience homelessness or are at risk for homelessness. This grant would be of importance to CCC in order for the institution to demonstrate its advocacy on behalf of its students.
