Malcolm X College has requested additional funds to support infrastructure improvements aligned with Phase II & III of the West Campus renovations. Grant funds will be utilized for a portion of the costs, including any that are prior incurred, associated with the oversight and construction of various improvements and upgrades to the Grantee-Owned Westside Learning Center (WSLC). The proposed enhancements include landscaping, exterior lighting, parking lots and finish trades for the project. The completion of this project will benefit the public by providing community members (both within and outside the direct service area) with post-secondary education in CTE, General Education and Continuing Education programs.

The Highway Construction Career Training Program is a renewal grant designed to equip up to 30 students with essential skills in the construction trades, covering areas such as Carpentry, Welding, Plumbing, OSHA standards, Flagging, and Scaffolding certifications. Funded by the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), this program ensures that students receive \$15 per hour for their training. Additionally, the program provides all necessary personal protective equipment (PPE), including work boots. These funds are crucial for several reasons. Firstly, they enable us to offer comprehensive training that empowers individuals from undeserved communities. By doing so, we help them acquire the skills needed to secure livable wages in the construction industry. Secondly, the financial support and provision of PPE remove barriers to participation, ensuring that all students can fully engage with the training program without incurring out-of-pocket expenses. Investing in this program means investing in the future of our communities, fostering economic growth, and creating opportunities for individuals to build sustainable careers in construction.

McDonald's Corporation has awarded the City Colleges of Chicago Foundation a grant of \$100,000 to fund work related to the Chicago Roadmap and Career Launch Chicago youth apprenticeship program. These programs provide holistic support to Chicago youth on their path to meaningful employment. The funds will be used to support large-scale events for CPS high schoolers to come to City Colleges and explore in-demand career opportunities, as well as consultants to deepen our professional development curriculum for Career Launch Chicago pre- and youth apprentices. The City Colleges of Chicago Foundation will pass through \$86,957 to City Colleges for grant administration, and \$13,043 will be administered by CCCF.

Olive-Harvey College, in partnership with the City Colleges of Chicago District Office, was awarded the FY26 DERA grant to advance developmental education reform through the creation and implementation of a Tableau dashboard that enables real-time, disaggregated monitoring of student progress in developmental and gateway English and math courses. The funder is looking to support initiatives that build faculty capacity, scale evidence-based models, and foster continuous assessment to drive equitable student outcomes. Our concept involves hiring a qualified consultant to develop the dashboard, training faculty and staff to use it for data-informed decision-making and scaling its use across all CCC colleges. Grant funds will be used for dashboard development, professional training, and the district-wide launch and documentation of best practices. This project will directly impact faculty, staff, and students at Olive-Harvey College and, ultimately, all seven City Colleges, with a focus on closing equity gaps by race/ethnicity, gender, and other indicators. The grant is critically important to CCC as it will expand our data capacity, empower targeted interventions, and foster a culture of continuous improvement, positioning CCC as a leader in developmental education reform and accelerating progress toward equitable student success in gateway courses.

NASH (National Association of Higher Education Systems), in partnership with Google, is pleased to support public higher education systems through a Community of Practice (CoP) focused on expanding access to micro credentials - specifically the Google Career Certificates (GCCs) and AI Essentials - to learners enrolled in and/or served by systems of higher education and across the United States. This initiative brings together higher education systems and supports their faculty and leaders in efforts to expand access to micro credentials. Through participation in this national Community of Practice, CCC will strengthen its capacity to integrate Google micro credentials into curricula in ways that improve student employability, instructional coherence, and cross-institutional collaboration. CCC's concept is to convene a cross-college Community of Practice composed of faculty, instructional leaders, and workforce practitioners who will collaboratively design, pilot, and refine the integration of Google micro credentials into priority programs. The CoP will serve as a structured learning and implementation space where participants share best practices, align credentials to program outcomes, and develop strategies for student advising, assessment, and employer recognition. Grant funds will support faculty and staff participation in the Community of Practice, including stipends, professional learning activities, and coordination support. Funds will also be used for instructional planning, curriculum alignment, and dissemination of lessons learned across the district to support broader adoption and sustainability. Balance of funds will be used for travel for required conferences.
